Relationship Status and Partner Violence

Cohabitors—particularly serial cohabitors—experience more intimate partner violence than individuals who are married or dating. This finding illustrates the importance of sexual exclusivity for relationship quality, <u>according</u> to researchers at Bowling Green State University.



Parents' Presence Helps Children Learn

Children learn more from television when their parents watch the program with them than when the children watch the program alone, <u>reports</u> researchers at Texas Tech University.



Economic Security Among Older Americans

Partnered elderly receive more in Social Security benefits and experience less poverty than unpartnered elderly. Unpartnered women—particularly gray divorced and nevermarried women—face the greatest economic insecurity, <u>reports</u> researchers at Bowling Green State University.
