Religion in America

Seventy four percent of Americans identify with a Christian religion, and 53 percent say that religion is very important in their lives, according to a recent <u>Gallup report</u>.



Religious Composition of Congress

Ninety one percent of America's Congressional members describe themselves as Christian—only a minimal decline from 95 percent of Congressional members in the 1960s, reports Pew Research.



Marriage: The Key to Surviving a Stroke

Married adults are more likely to survive a stroke than never married, divorced, or widowed people, <u>according</u> to researchers at Duke University.
