American Family Survey: Marriage, Family, and Policy Attitudes Although liberals and conservatives disagree about the social significance and merits of marriage, they differ minimally in their day-to-day family functioning, <u>reports</u> Brigham Young University and Desert News.



Fathers' Childbearing Intentions and Child Involvement Whether a father considers a pregnancy intended, mistimed, or unintended affects his involvement in the child's life and selfassessed parenting quality, <u>according to</u> researchers at the Guttmacher Institute.
