Effects of Family Structure on Poverty

NEW RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS



Unwed Births Decline for Immigrant Women

Births outside of marriage declined by 33 percent for U.S. immigrant women between 2008 and 2014. This trend will significantly shape America because foreign-born mothers are responsible for the nation's long-term growth in annual births, <u>reports</u> the Pew Research Center.



Shotgun Marriages Increase Among Vulnerable Populations

Shotgun marriages have increased substantially among black, young, and/ or low-educated mothers over the last two decades; however, shotgun marriages are quite resilient among these vulnerable subpopulations, <u>according</u> to researchers at Duke University.



Cohabiting and Asymmetrical Relationships

Couples who cohabited prior to marriage were significantly more likely to be in an asymmetrical relationship—a relationship in which one partner is considerably more committed than the other—than couples who did not cohabit, <u>reports</u> researchers from the University of Denver and Florida State University.
