Marriage Expectations and Crime

Young adults who expect to marry in the near future commit fewer acts of delinquency, <u>reports</u> Rachel Arocho and Claire Kamp Dush of Ohio State University.



Divorce Linked to Husband's Unemployment

Whereas couples married prior to 1974 generally divorced if the wife did not satisfy homemaking duties, couples married after 1975 primarily divorce if the husband fails to fulfill the breadwinning role. Alexandra Killewald of Harvard University <u>reports</u> on these changing patterns.



Effect of "Boomerang Fathers" on Adolescent Girls

Adolescent females experience fewer depressive symptoms when they have a boomerang biological father—one that cycles in and out of the household—than an absent biological father. Daphne Hernandez of the University of Houston and colleagues <u>suggest</u> that boomerang fathers help their daughters by deterring unrelated males from entering the household.
