



Behavioral Implications of Divorce

Two national assessments show that parental divorce worsens children's behavior, decreases life opportunities, and increases the risk of morbidity and mortality.

Adolescent Behavior and Religious Practice

A longitudinal study in the American Journal of Epidemiology reports that adolescents who practice religion weekly exhibit greater life satisfaction, positive affect, and lower risks of drug use and early sexual experiences.

Educational and Relationships Outcomes of Divorce

A recent <u>study</u> in the *Journal of Child Abuse and Neglect* indicates that adverse childhood experiences (like divorce) reduce educational attainment and intimate relationship longevity.

Family Structure and Parental Influence

A national <u>assessment</u> illustrates how parental influence varies by the marital status of parents. Married fathers are more influential in their children's church attendance than divorced or stepfathers.
