Parent-Child Bond, Socioeconomic Status, and Health

Although growing up in a high socioeconomic status improves children's health outcomes, a poor parent-child bond eliminates these health benefits, <u>reports</u> Matthew Andersson of Baylor University.



Religious Disaffiliation Linked to Parents' Divorce

Children raised by divorced parents more frequently identify as "religiously unaffiliated" as compared to children raised by married parents. Among those who do retain their religious affiliation, children raised by divorced parents attend religious services less frequently, <u>according</u> to Betsy Cooper and colleagues of the Public Religion Research Institute.



Date Nights Make Married Couples Happier

Married couples who went out on monthly date nights were significantly less likely to separate than married couples who did not go out at all. Date nights made no difference for cohabiting couples, who are already significantly more likely than married couples to break-up, reports Harry Benson of the UK's Marriage Foundation.
