



<u>Parental Warmth and</u> <u>Offspring Physical Health</u>

An <u>assessment</u> examining how parenting quality impacts children's health indicates that low levels of parental affection and high levels of abuse increase health risks across regulatory systems, while high levels of parental warmth and affection decrease multisystem health risks.

<u>Family Structure and</u> <u>Parenting Quality</u>

An <u>article</u> in *Demography* explains that fracture in the family diminishes maternal parenting quality by decreasing social support and increasing material hardship.

Parenting Harshness and Aggression in Children

A new study in the Journal of the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry reports that harsh parenting increases children's aggression and lowers both empathy and morality, and that warm parenting decreases low empathy and weak morality.

From the work of many but especially Charles Murray we know that the bottom 10% is largely composed of those of low IQ... those with an IQ lower than 80. They are not too bright. And in today's more and more complex world they are at greater and greater disadvantage through no fault of their own. The Army refuses to take anyone with an IQ in that category, so that route, effective for many as a first step up and out, is closed off to them. Many groups help the "mobile" sector of the poor.
