### APA Guidelines for Girls and Women



The APA warns psychologists that [traditional female gender roles](#) (i.e. caregiving, nurturing, staying at home vs. working) can devalue women, deplete their emotional resources, lessen their personal development and independence, and create conditions of inequality where women are more likely to be victims of abuse

### Importance of Nurturing Environments



[Nurturing](#) environments reduce physical and psychological negative experiences, problem behaviors, and increase pro-social behavior, self-control, and positive psychological skills.

### Feminine Strengths are Still Valued

## Millennial Women are Less Feminine



While women still report that it is important to look [feminine](#), only [19%](#) millennial women state that they are very feminine.

## Most Women Do Not Want to Work Full-Time



Two PEW articles show that the [ideal household situation](#) for Americans with young children is for one parent to work full time and the other part time (or work from the home). Almost [half of women](#) (47%) state that part time work would be ideal.



Women in America are [most valued](#) for their ability to nurture and to be empathic. More than half of Americans attest that women take care of infants [better](#) than men.

## Gender Matters: Mother-Daughter Communication



Mother-child relationships and successful [communication](#) contributes to mental wellbeing and higher life satisfaction, especially for girls. Life satisfaction is significantly lower for boys and girls of single father families and for girls with difficult maternal communication.
